## LVRA MEETS

### JUNE 1st

Mr. Clay Kline, Representative of New York Life Insurance Co. and Mr. John Cassidy, will be on hand at the JUNE 1st meeting of the LVRA to present a short talk on insurance. If you have any questions or are in the dark regarding your fire policy on your house and just what is covered under it, now is a good time to find out. Liability and other phases of insurance will also be covered, so be sure and attend. All residents of L. V. and their friends are welcome at the meetings. Remember, June 1st at 7:30 in the Multi-purpose room at Fairwood School. Babysitting is available in the Kindergarten room under adult supervision.

The LVRA has filed incorporation papers with the California Secretary of State and within a month should become an incorporated body.

What advantage is to be gained by incorporating? Primarily there is the liability factor. If an association is not incorporated and a suit for damages is brought against it, each member of that association is liable and can be made to pay. But with an incorporated body, only the assets of that corporation are open to claim.

Naturally the association will be fully covered by the proper insurance to pay any claims which might be made for damages. Nevertheless, it gives a welcome feeling of security to know that your savings will never be put in jeopardy due to membership in the organization.

Another advantage is that the LVRA is not just another group of private citizens banded together upon mutual consent. It is an entity which has been recognized by the State of California and can operate as a business if so desired.

Now the LVRA is incorporated as a non-profit organization. This means that no dividends will be paid to the share-holders at the end of the year. Other than this one feature, which gives us a big break as far as taxation is concerned, this corporation is free to pursue any course it so desires.

So now that we have a good foundation, let's really build the LVRA in to a going concern—bring your ideas, enthusiasms, and above all, yourselves to the meetings. The LVRA needs you, and you need the LVRA.

#### ANTI-RABIES VACCINATION CLINICS

The Santa Clara County Health Department has announced the June schedule of anti-rabies vaccination clinics as follows:

Thursday, June 4 Lafayette Playground, Lafayette and Clay Streets, 10:00 AM to 12:00 Noon and 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM.

By ordinance all dogs must be vaccinated against rabies before a dog license can be issued and every dog must be licensed.

There is a non-profit fee of \$1.50 for the vaccination which is valid for a period of 2 years. The license fee is \$2.00 per year.

#### GREEN THUMB by W. Shoemaker

Research has proven us wrong again. The agricultural research at Fort Collins, Colo. and others throughout the United States have made a 5 year study of the most efficient way to water a lawn.

Almost everyone will tell you to wait until a lawn is dry and then soak it thoroughly; but, says research, light watering done frequently is by far the best.

They say grass roots will go just as deep, as they do not reach up for water. If a lawn dries as little as a half-inch, it is badly in need of water.

So water your lawn often; once a day if you can, and don't let your sprinkler run too long. You will probably save water by this method as it all won't run down the gutter. If you would like more information on this, please feel free to call me.

You will find lots of worms in your lawn this month. A good worm spray at this time would sure help. I would like to recommend that you call in a professional spray man twice a year to spray your whole yard. It doesn't cost much, and the results are amazing.

Lots of people have asked me how to start their landscaping. First draw a rough plan to scale and put everything in it that you want in your yard such as patio, play areas, raised planters, screens, pergolas, seats and lawns.

If you have a narrow back yard keep all lines running the short way of the yard. This will make it look longer.

When you have completed your sketch, bring it to the next LVRA meeting, and I will help you out with it.

If your plans look OK on paper, it will probably look OK on the ground. If you like, come over and look at our yard at 1053 Blazingwood Drive.

### IT'S THE LAW

Parents who are in the habit of letting their children play in the streets are violating the following Sunnyvale ordinance which reads:

#### STANDING IN ROADWAYS

No person shall stand in any roadway other than in a safety zone or in a crosswalk if such action interferes with the lawful movement of traffic. This section shall not apply to any public officer or employee or employee of a public utility when necessarily upon a street in line of duty.

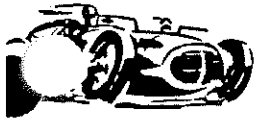
