Parade at Risk—Estimated Cost Is \$2000— That LVNA Does Not Have

December is coming up fast and I am in the process of planning the annual Lakewood Village Holiday Parade, which is scheduled for December 11, 2004. However, this year the Lakewood Village Neighborhood Association is facing some high fees we haven't had to pay before, and so the entire parade is jeopardized. Before last year, the only expenses the LVNA had for the parade were the snacks and drinks for the party afterwards at the park. Last year, because of budget cuts, the City of Sunnyvale decided to charge us to cover costs they had previously provided for free. First they wanted to charge us a \$100 fee for an Unenclosed Use Permit. This they decided to waive because it was the first year they were charging it and we hadn't known about that cost in advance. Then they wanted us to pay for city employees to put up barricades. Thanks to the efforts of Lakewood resident and former parade planner Craig Crawford, we had a matching grant from the city to cover costs of the parade, so the barricade fees were covered. This year, however, we have no grant and no fee waiver, and the city also wants to charge us for the overtime expenses of the public safety officers needed to manage the road closure and traffic directing needed for the parade. We are also faced with a new insurance premium. Previously, insurance coverage was included in the annual membership fee we pay to the United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County organization. We had to let them know about

big events, but no additional premiums were charged. This year is far different: the insurance company that UNSCC uses has increased its fees dramatically. We now face an unknown--possibly \$200 or more--insurance premium for events such as the picnic and parade. Altogether, the costs we face this year for the parade are about \$2000. This is an amount the LVNA simply cannot cover.

LVNA vice president Thom Mayer has talked to Mayor John Howe and City Manager Amy Chan about the estimated charges, but no decision has been made yet about how, or if, city officials will help find a way to cover these costs for us. The Lakewood Village Holiday Parade is a tradition in Sunnyvale, and city officials are major participants. As far as I know, it is also the city's only major parade. The mayor and the city manager have both acknowledged that it is an important holiday tradition that serves the city through community building, so we hope that they will find a way to help us. The major cost is the overtime pay for the public safety officers, estimated at \$1260. Even if that

and the permit fee of \$110 are somehow covered by the city, we still face \$630 or so in estimated expenses for insurance, barricades, and food. You can help! If you are interested in contributing a monetary donation toward the parade, we would be glad to receive it. Because the parade is in jeopardy, no checks would be cashed unless we knew we were going forward with it. Checks can be made payable to Lakewood Village Neighborhood Association and should be sent to the new treasurer, Faith Rogers, at 1193 Redrock Ct. Sunnyvale, CA 94089. For now, I will continue to contact potential participants and move ahead with the plans for the parade. By the time the next Villager issue comes out, we will know whether there will be a parade this year or not.

Annual UNSCC Conference Was Great!

Last year I took the opportunity to attend the 10th anniversary annual conference of the United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County (UNSCC). It was a most informative day of seminars on issues affecting neighborhood associations. Even though faced with a severe budget crisis and the loss of their one paid employee, UNSCC again organized a great event that was again highly informative. This year I attended a workshop on conflict resolution and learned about local resources available to help bring conflicts to a favorable resolution. These include Project Sentinel and the Santa Clara County Office of Human Relations Dispute Resolution Program. If you have a conflict with a neighbor (or anyone else, for that matter) that you need help with, you can contact these

organizations. Project Sentinel can be reached at 408-720-9888. The Santa Clara County Office of Human Relations Dispute Resolution Program phone number is 408-792-2300.

I also attended a seminar on neighborhood planning, which urged local residents to stay informed about plans their city may have and how those fit in with the vision a neighborhood may have for itself. The final session I attended was on the woeful situation of the insurance coverage available for neighborhood association events. Ed Rast of the UNSCC has done an outstanding job of wading through the insurance information and grilling the insurance company itself to better understand the whole process and how to protect the member neighborhoods without leaving ourselves open to unnecessarily large premiums. The UNSCC provides a much-needed service by bringing together people who are involved with neighborhood associations so we can learn about issues that affect us all. ■

Safety in Tense Situations

The fatal shooting of two men near Lakewood Elementary School and Lakewood Park on October 12 and an assault on a man walking in the park in the evening of October 7 point out the need for taking measures to keep yourself and the neighborhood safe.

Helped by information from neighborhood residents, Sunnyvale public safety officers arrested six suspects, less than 24 hours after the shootings. Police investigation indicated that the murders resulted from a domestic dispute, not drug dealing or gang activity. The action of residents, who reported hearing gunshots and later answered the questions asked by police, made the fast arrests possible.

The other criminal incident, the assault, occurred when a man walking his dog confronted a group who were drinking beer and painting graffiti on a concrete table and trash cans. He told them to stop. The man was punched and kicked. Such incidents are not common in Lakewood Village, but this assault should remind us all to take some common-sense precautions:

- Be alert and aware of people and activities around you when on the street or in a park.
- Walk with another person, if possible.
- Avoid walking after dark.
- Carry a cell phone.
- Report suspicious or illegal activity.

Don't confront people who are acting suspicious or doing something illegal. Instead, call 911 if it's an emergency, such as a person with a gun. Be prepared to give the location of the emergency — street address or street or highway area. If the situation is not an emergency, call 730-7100 to reach Sunnyvale Public Safety. Other numbers to use are the drug hotline, 245-3784, and the graffiti hotline, 730-7680.

If you see people doing something illegal, try to observe as many details as you can, and be prepared to help the police in their investigation. ■

November in Your Yard and Garden

- Finish planting spring bulbs.
- Shop for native plants and set them in the garden.
- Complete fall cleanup in the garden.
- Despite the drop in the temperature, composting continues. Add disease-free leaves and chopped-up, dead annuals to the compost pile. Remember to keep the pile as damp as a wrung-out sponge for faster composting.
- Keep after the snails.
- Watch out for ants invading the house from the garden.
- Wrap vulnerable, young tree trunks, particularly citrus trees, with paper or burlap to protect them from freezing.
- Water plants as needed.
- Stabilize plants that might be harmed by autumn wind.
- Prune wisteria and clematis to control size and encourage new flowering wood in spring. Lightly prune forsythia.
- Water roses but withhold all fertilizer. When the ground freezes, mulch the rose bed heavily.
- Finish transplanting fall- and winter-flowering plants into the bedding plot.
- Harvest what is left of the summer vegetables before the rain and cold destroy them. Continue to plant the winter vegetable garden with cool-season crops such as beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, onions, parsnips, and turnips. If you have put the vegetable garden to rest over the winter, cover it with manure so that the manure will age properly over the winter.
- Flush your watering system to remove mineral deposits. Soak all newly transplanted plants until the rains come.

October 13 General Meeting

1. Captain Mark Stivers, from Sunnyvale Public Safety, provided information on the double homicide that took place October 12 outside of Lakewood School. Captain Stivers said that it appears to have started as a domestic dispute.

Arrests have been made in this case.

There was also a recent assault in Lakewood Park on a Lakewood Village resident by a group of men who were observed putting graffiti on park property. As of October 30, no arrests have been made in this case. **If anyone has information regarding this incident please contact Sunnyvale Public Safety, 730-7100.**

2. Michele Bromstead, newly assigned Community Outreach Coordinator, described her role and responsibilities in assisting with neighborhood events and activities.

3. Val Rivera, from the Sunnyvale Housing Division, provided a briefing on the Housing Rehabilitation Program. This program can assist low-income families, the disabled, and senior citizens.

4. Jeff Goldman, from the city Planning Department, provided a briefing on Sunnyvale's Consolidated Plan. This is a five-year plan that covers the city's housing and community development needs. It deals with four major federal funding programs and sets priorities for use of funds and grants.

5. Open forum – Voter information pamphlets were available. Fairwood School is participating in a contest for recycling old phone books. Drainage, trash, and tree removal issues were discussed.

October 28 Board Meeting

1. Faith Rogers was nominated for LVNA treasurer. The nomination was approved. LVNA bank account activity and *Villager* advertising accounts were reviewed.

2. The LVNA Annual Christmas Parade was discussed. Because of the city's current budget, LVNA might be required to fund all aspects of the parade, including the Public Safety, permit, barricades, insurance, and refreshments. The Board is working with the city to get assistance for this traditional event, and will attempt to find sponsors and grants. **This year's Holiday Parade is in jeopardy** unless funding assistance is received. ■

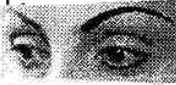
