Getting Sunnyvale's History Out of Storage

At the April general meeting of the Lakewood Village Neighborhood Association we were treated to an interesting presentation by Laura Babcock, chair of the Sunnyvale Historical Society and Museum Association. Laura started with a quiz about the city's history and then told us about the mission of this organization: to build the Sunnyvale Heritage Park Museum. The museum will be a look-alike reconstruction of the original house of the Murphy family, Sunnyvale's founding family. Originally located in what became Murphy Park, the Murphy house was lived in by members of the Murphy family until 1953, when it was given to the city of Sunnyvale. The house was damaged by fire and then later demolished, in 1961, to make way for Central Expressway. The reconstruction will be a modern building meeting all public access requirements, but it will retain some of the layout of the original. It will look just like the original from the outside, but some of the interior space has been redesigned to serve the needs of the museum, which include an extensive hands-on education series for children. Currently Sunnyvale's third-graders are able to participate in this "1905 House" experience at one of the park buildings one time during the year, but the new museum will provide a much more convenient space that will serve more children. The children learn what

life was like in 1905 for the Murphy family, complete with "a hands-on experience with artifacts of the period, including kitchen tools, washtubs and washboards, and old-fashioned toys," according to the Heritage Park Museum website at www.heritageparkmuseum.org.

The Murphy Park building does currently house a tiny Sunnyvale history museum, but most of what could be displayed is stuck in storage. The new museum will finally allow all the wonderful artifacts to come out and be seen. The museum will be located in Orchard Heritage Park, in the area near the Community and Senior Centers at El Camino Real and Remington, looking out on the apricot orchard. Children currently have the opportunity to learn about apricot harvesting and drying from Charlie Olsen, who runs the apricot operation out of the barn in Orchard Heritage Park, so the new museum will just add to the rich history lessons available there. This project is a wonderful effort to preserve Sunnyvale's history, provide further education about the early days in this area, and foster a bit of local pride.

On April 17 a fund-raising walk around the orchard added funds to the museum project, and other fund-raising activities are planned for the summer. Much of the money needed to begin construction of the museum has been raised already, but a large amount is still needed. May in Your Yard and Garden

- Weed while the weeds are young and the soil is still damp enough to make pulling the weeds easy. Do not let the weeds form seed heads.
- Add young, seed-head-free weeds to the compost pile.

Remember to keep the pile as damp as a wrung-out sponge for faster composting.

- Watch out for snails and earwigs, both of which devour seedlings.
- Use a strong spray from the hose to wash away aphids.
- Wrap fruit tree trunks with a sticky tape to control ants, but remember to wrap low so that birds, particularly hummingbirds, will not be attracted.
- Prepare for the coming hot, dry season by applying a mulch. Rice hulls are an excellent, inexpensive soil amendment. Contact a rice growers' cooperative to find the nearest local source.
- Prune spring-blooming plants as they finish blooming. To keep old lilacs vigorous, prune a few of the lilac stems to the ground each year, and prune suckers off grafted varieties of lilacs.
- Fertilize lawns, roses, and all flowering plants about to bloom. Fertilize azaleas, camellias, and rhododendrons when they finish blooming. If you did not fertilize them last month, fertilize citrus, trees, and shrubs.
- Plant out summer bulbs such as callas, cannas, dahlias, gladiolus, lilies, tigridia, and tuberous begonias.
- Set out summer-flowering plants.
- Plant the vegetable garden and thin vegetable seedlings that were sown too close together by snipping them with scissors.

Goats Return to Sunnyvale

Like the swallows to San Juan Capistrano and the buzzards to Hinckley, Ohio, the goats have returned to Sunnyvale.

More than 600 goats, with about 160 sheep in accompaniment, now blanket the landscape at the closed Sunnyvale landfill. The animals, complete with herding dogs, have been provided by Natural Solutions, a Santa Cruz-based business that rents out the goats clear the land. Sunnyvale has had several fires over the years at the landfill as the summer-dried grasses become volatile. Ironically, in some instances the fires have been ignited by the mowers being used to cut the grass back for fire prevention. Mechanical mowers also pose a threat to the gas collection system which uses the methane gas generated naturally by the landfill to power City facilities. Damage in the past from mowers has been costly to repair. The goats very effectively reduce the fire hazard without any damage to the gas collection system.

According to Scott Kulenguskey of Natural Solutions, a mixture of South African Boer goats and Spanish goats are working the hillside along with South African Doper sheep. Four border collies and a Great Pyrenees act as livestock guards. "Goats provide the ultimate in ecologically-friendly fire prevention," said Sunnyvale Solid Waste Program Manager Mark Bowers. "The goats are far less damaging to our gas collection system than mechanical mowers, they reduce the spread of undesirable plant species such as the yellow star thistle, and goats don't create noise or air pollution."

Sunnyvale pays \$20,000 for the goats. Comparable costs for tractor mowing range from \$10,000 to \$15,000. But in at least one instance, \$12,000 worth of damage was attributed to the mowers. ■

Regulations, Shortage of Affordable Housing Challenge Businesses in Silicon Valley

UNSCC Advisory Council Hears Good and Not-So-Good News

A new wave of innovation and an upturn in the economy will re-energize Silicon Valley in the near future, the CEO and president of the San Jose Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce told the Advisory Council for the United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County (UNSCC). Speaking at the March meeting of the Advisory Council, Jim Cunneen also said that business owners find state and local regulations, such as the workers' compensation rate and mandated health insurance coverage, burdensome. Such regulations, Cunneen said, discourage businesses from locating in the valley.

An Advisory Council member asked what could be done about affordable housing if wages are kept low. Cunneen said that some businesses are taking housing costs into account by offering higher starting pay. High-density housing near transit centers is necessary and should be built, he noted.

The Bay Area is chronically short of housing by 20,000 units, Beverly Bryant, executive director of the Southern Division of the Homebuilders Association of Northern California, told the Advisory Council. She noted that this is an important statistic because housing is crucial in getting industry and business to come to this area. High housing prices do keep companies out.

Bryant said that upcoming state legislation will propose that sales tax revenues go to the state but property tax revenues go to the cities where the taxpayers live. She also said that "green" buildings, in which recycled materials are used and which are energy efficient, are needed because of dwindling natural resources such as wood. Few condos are built in the state, she noted, because of the possibility of building-defects lawsuits. A state bill in the works would give make it mandatory for builders to have the opportunity to repair defects before lawsuits are filed.

Land Use Committee Wants Representatives

The UNSCC Planning and Land Use Committee is

asking for representatives from throughout the county to help the committee monitor local planning, land use, traffic, and transportation issues. UNSCC has paired Sunnyvale with Mountain View for this purpose. The representative must have access to e-mail, but should use an association e-mail address, rather than a personal e-mail address, to receive monthly Planning and Land Use Committee updates and notifications about issues affecting particular neighborhoods.

Event Insurance for Member Neighborhood Associations

The event insurance, included in UNSCC dues, covers typical recurring events such as neighborhood association meetings, parades, and picnics. Recent applications for construction projects and a store were refused because covering them would be too expensive. Requests for special events should be submitted 3 to 4 weeks before the event, ideally before the UNSCC Board meeting of the month.

New Membership Categories

UNSCC bylaws are being revised to include nonvoting (but dues paying) membership categories—e.g., businesses—to offset loss of funding from grants that are no longer available because of the fiscal downturn in Silicon Valley. ■

Sunnyvale Public Safety Expands Volunteer Program

The Sunnyvale City Council Tuesday (April 20) unanimously approved the expansion of the Volunteers in Public Safety (VIPS) program. This innovative program uses volunteers in low-risk enforcement and administrative roles to enhance services provided to the community and improve public understanding of the City's public safety mission.

The Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety (DPS) has a strong history of using volunteers, but had previously limited volunteer assignments to administrative duties and special events. The VIPS program, which the Council approved as a pilot project in 2000, marked the first time DPS had used volunteers in enforcement activities. Volunteers in that early program were assigned to perform parking enforcement and abandoned vehicle identification.

"Volunteers and volunteer programs are at the heart of the City of Sunnyvale," said Sunnyvale Mayor John Howe. "By expanding this program, we are going to be able to improve upon the public safety services we already provide, while being cost effective."

Currently 10 volunteers, ranging in age from college students to senior citizens, volunteer in the VIPS program. They perform a wide range of duties, from marking and tagging nuisance vehicles for abatement to serving as public safety chaplain. In total, volunteers give nearly 200 hours per month of their time to support public safety. With its decision to continue the VIPS program, the City Council also approved an expansion of the program over the next two years. This could add as many as 20 more volunteers, and new services such as bike licensing, traffic calming and neighborhood watch coordination.

Pederson is skilled at involving the audience in her music. She has appeared nationally in concerts, schools and on television and radio programs. She has two Magical Music Express recordings available, "Friendship Stew" and "Music is Magic".

45 years ago: In 1959, A "Lakewood Village Aquatic Club" was announced. It was to have been a members-only club at Manzano and Oak Creek, with 2 adult pools, 1 child pool, clubhouse, outdoor games area for croquet and horseshoes, and plans for miniature golf and tennis courts.

41 years ago: In 1963, the president of the LVRA proclaimed the month of May to be "Lakewood Beautiful" month. *Every* month should be "Lakewood Beautiful" month.

37 years ago: Speaking of beauty, in May 1967 the first (and only) "Miss Lakewood Village" beauty contest was held. Entrants were judged for poise, talent, and beauty. No formalwear was required, but the girls did need to display themselves in one-piece bathing suits. Times have changed...

33 years ago: At the other end of the beauty scale, in May 1971, citizens of Lakewood Village and surrounding areas successfully mounted a campaign to stop the construction of a slaughterhouse located (I believe) where there is now one of the mobile home parks.

8 years ago: In 1996, Lakewood Village's Eugene Goldsmith was among five Sunnyvale residents who carried the Olympic Torch through Sunnyvale on its way to the summer games in Atlanta.
