### *Dumpster Day Report*

Dumpster Day was a great success this year—we cleared out almost 171 tons of debris from our neighborhood! Fifty-nine loads of material and 33 tires were collected. For the most part the day went smoothly, although there were a few incidents where monitors were hassled or treated poorly. I would like to stress again that the Dumpster monitors are volunteers and are only trying to enforce the rules for dumping. All the Dumpster monitors deserve our thanks and respect.

Huge thanks go to Judy and Gary Fernandez for organizing and running the sale, which saved a lot of material from the landfill, as well as raising more than \$400 for the Lakewood Village Neighborhood Association. After the garage sale, we also donated one pickup-truck load of stuff to the Santa Maria Urban Mission. 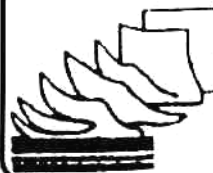

## August in Your Yard and Garden

- Continue to weed. Unfortunately as long as it's the growing season, it is also the weeding season. Add young, seedhead-free weeds and excess summer growth to the compost pile. Remember to keep the pile as damp as a wrung-out sponge for faster composting.
- Keep after the snails
- Use a strong spray from the hose to wash away aphids.
- Pick up fallen fruit and vegetables (particularly if they are planted near the house) to discourage ants from forming colonies near your dwelling.
- Insulate the garden soil from the hot, dry weather by applying a two-inch-thick mulch.
- Fertilize plants if you see signs of pale, lackluster growth. Yellow leaves with green veins often indicate an iron deficiency that can be corrected with a chelated iron. Fertilize the lawn. Fertilize all flowering plants about to bloom. Fertilize roses, except most antique roses.
- Pinch off dead flowers. In particular pick off spent blooms from crape myrtles to bring on extra flowers in the fall. Make sure you get the entire flower head—particularly the swollen ovaries where seeds form.
- Hold off transplanting fall- and winter-flowering plants into the bedding plot. Hot weather is hard on newly transplanted plants. If you do transplant, shade them for a few days with the temporary shelter of an umbrella or wooden shake. Stake tall sprawling flowers.
- Harvest vegetables as they ripen. Pick them early in the day.
- Continue to monitor your watering system. Soak all newly transplanted plants.

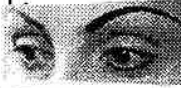

## San Jose Earthquakes Team Schedules Neighborhood Recognition Night

The San Jose Earthquakes soccer team will recognize neighborhood associations at their game on Saturday, August 21 against the Dallas Burn. Group tickets are \$12 for adults and \$9 for youths (14 years old and under) and seniors (60 and older). The group must have at least 15 people to get these prices. There is a handling charge of \$1.50 per order. Kick off at Spartan Stadium, San Jose State University, is at 7 p.m. Parking at the stadium costs \$8 to \$10 per car.

The order must be received by the Earthquakes office in time for the tickets to be mailed to the organizer. ■

## UNSCC To Raise Member Dues

Starting in 2005, membership fees for the United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County (UNSCC) will be about \$250 per year, the UNSCC Advisory Council agreed at its July 21 meeting (the current fee is \$90). The major benefit of membership is insurance for neighborhood association events, and the costs for that insurance have increased dramatically this year. Active participation in UNSCC activities (planning the annual conference, for example) will result in additional benefits such as reduced insurance cost for a neighborhood association's special event.

Because UNSCC has lost 70% of its grant money as a result of the downturn in the local economy, it now depends primarily on dues to cover all expenses. Of the \$16,000 annual budget, \$10,000 currently goes to event insurance, and the insurer, Nonprofits' Insurance Alliance of California, has indicated that coverage of all events for UNSCC member associations could increase to \$30,000 per year. Members of the UNSCC board are attempting to renegotiate coverage costs, but at this time, special events, such as the LVNA picnic and holiday parade, will require additional fees from the neighborhood associations. Regular events, such as monthly meetings, are covered.

UNSCC will charge all member associations a one-time assessment of \$50 this year, to help make up budget shortfalls.

UNSCC will soon do a survey of its member associations to determine the number and nature of events each year. The board members hope to negotiate quantity discounts.

### **Speakers at the Advisory Council Meeting** **Sheriff's Department**

Santa Clara County Sheriff Laurie Smith explained Sheriff's Department services and programs and how budget cuts (\$12 million in the past two years) has affected them. The department, which is responsible for law enforcement in unincorporated areas (73% of Santa Clara County), has 650 deputies. Special teams include SWAT, crowd control, and body recovery from water. The Sheriff's Department is also now in charge of the county coroner's office. On contract, the department provides police protection for Cupertino, Los Altos Hills, and Saratoga. Locations of high-risk sex offenders are now posted on the department's Web site:

### **Secondary Living Units in San Jose**

State Assembly bill 1866, passed in 2002, encourages creation of secondary living units near or in existing houses in areas zoned for

single-family dwellings. The intent of the bill is to lessen the shortage of housing in the area. John Davidson, of the San Jose Planning Department, explained the city's restrictions on these living areas, including owner occupancy of one of the two units, a maximum of 650 square feet for the secondary unit, and a minimum lot size of 6,500 square feet. Planning Department staff estimate that there are 2,700 unpermitted secondary units in San Jose. As in other Bay area cities, the shortage of building-code enforcement staff means that unpermitted units are investigated only if someone complains about them. One of Davidson's charts indicated that in Sunnyvale the minimum lot size for a house with a second living unit is 9,000 square feet.

### **Other Presentations**

#### **House Resolution 4459 Llagas Reclamation Groundwater Remediation Initiative**

Rick Callender, local and regional government affairs manager for the Santa Clara Valley Water District, requests that neighborhood associations support HR 4459, which would authorize \$25 million for cleanup of contamination that originated from perchlorate from a highway safety flare manufacturing plant. Federal assistance would ensure that the groundwater basin in the Llagas Valley area of southern Santa Clara County is restored and cleaned up. #### **Keypoint Credit Union**

Keypoint, a UNSCC neighborhood business sponsor, now allows neighborhood associations and their members to open accounts. There are Keypoint branches at 505 N. Mathilda in Sunnyvale and at Rivermark in Santa Clara.

#### **Annual Conference**

Each fall, UNSCC hosts a conference for all neighborhood organizations in Santa Clara County and nearby counties. The format varies from how-to workshops and inspirational speakers to interactive brainstorming and goal-setting for neighborhoods. This event draws neighborhood leaders throughout the county.
