Why Do We Care?

As usual, turnout for the January LVNA general meeting was small, and I have been musing about why—and what we might do about it.

At our LVNA board meeting, we discussed the upcoming board member elections in March, and mulled over the lack of attendance and volunteerism. The same small group of people has been doing the work of the LVNA for years, some are getting burned out, and those who had been involved before and have left are fondly remembered.

Now, I can really relate to non-participation. Before moving to Lakewood Village I wasn't involved in my neighborhood and I liked it that way. I didn't want to belong to the "paint police" (my nickname for the homeowner's association of our neighborhood in Colorado) and I didn't care what the issues of the neighborhood were. I knew a couple of the neighbors and that was it. I was completely ignorant of neighborhood-city interaction, local school issues, everything. I did no volunteer work whatsoever.

So, what has changed for me? Why do I care now? What value do I find in volunteering for the LVNA? Well, when I first moved here almost two years ago, there was a copy of the *Villager* on our door. I thought it was so cool! It had all this great information about the neighborhood, local businesses, and local issues. After a couple of months I decided to go to one of the LVNA meetings. There weren't many people there, but suddenly I had met some of the people in the neighborhood. One of them knew about the folks who had previously owned our house. Attending that meeting gave me a way to start to plug in to the new

neighborhood we had chosen. By getting involved with the LVNA I have come to feel "settled" in this neighborhood in a way I never felt in my previous neighborhood. I've met a lot of people and I now have the feeling that I am giving something back to my community. As my daughter grows up, I have the wonderful feeling that I am modeling good-citizen behavior for her. I am teaching her that it is a good thing to get involved locally, to care about the neighborhood we live in, and to give something back to the community. I don't just take her to watch the annual parade, I help plan it. We don't just go to the picnic, we help coordinate it. I no longer feel that I live on a little island, just one house in an unknown territory—I feel like I am part of a community.

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But nothing gets fixed! You may think that. After all, the same issues about speeding cars, traffic, pest control, trees etc. have been brought up time and time again. We sometimes have gotten organized enough to take issues to the city. It does little good. My attitude is, so what? I'm enjoying the journey of involvement, and I'm not focused on achievements. We will continue to be squeaky wheels on issues we care about, and someday if the economy ever turns around and the city has money again, we'll be ready to take advantage of that. In the meantime the sense of community involvement is there. That is the goal, in my way of looking at things.

We are coming up on election time for new board members. Why don't you sign up? Board members plan the general meetings and help to coordinate



the annual events that we have in the neighborhood. Call any of us board members, listed on the back of the *Villager*, if you want more information. It's a good way to meet long-time Lakewood Village residents and have a say in what LVNA does—or doesn't do.

Because of small turnout at the monthly general meetings, the LVNA Board is considering changing to a quarterly schedule. Come discuss the possibility with us at our next general meeting, on February 9, 2005 at the Lakewood Park building at 7 p.m.

UNSCC Needs Volunteers Too

I went to the United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County Advisory Council meeting for January. There were fewer than fifteen people in attendance, and this was their board election night. The people who were running for the board positions were the same people who had been holding positions the previous term, and sad reference was made to several people who had gotten burned out and left. Votes were cast and 5 out of 10 positions were filled. There was some grouchiness about the situation, but as the meeting broke up, the little team of volunteers was upbeat and cautiously optimistic. I was really impressed by their ongoing commitment to keeping this umbrella organization going. (One of the major benefits it offers is low-cost insurance for special events held by member neighborhood associations – and insurance coverage is required by the city of Sunnyvale for our parade and picnic.) As was pointed out at the Advisory Council meeting, most people there are "triple volunteers": leaders of their own neighborhood associations, board members for UNSCC, and committee members for one of UNSCC's projects, such as the annual conference or insurance application processing.

United Neighborhoods of Santa Clara County is very short of help. If you would like to be on their board, they would love it. If you would just like to be the LVNA representative to UNSCC, that would be great. All it entails is attending the Advisory Council meeting in San Jose every other month and letting the LVNA know what happened. ■

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

January 12 General Meeting

- 1. Josh Salans, Sunnyvale Community Gardens, briefed us on a new city project in which city land would be developed as a neighborhood garden with organic fruits and vegetables. - 2. We talked about Sunnyvale Public Safety bulletins regarding an increase in burglaries on the city's south side.
- 3. Holiday Lighting Contest winners who were present received their awards.
- 4. A general announcement for LVNA Board nominations encouraged interested Lakewood Village residents to contact any of the current board members (see back page of any issue of the Villager for names and phone numbers). Elections are scheduled for March.



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January 24 Sunnyvale Neighborhood Associations Quarterly Meeting

Two LVNA Board members (Ursula Syrova and Skip Gottschalk) met with city staff and members of other Sunnyvale neighborhood associations. Holiday events, fund raising, neighborhood garden projects, traffic calming, and local business involvement were some of the topics discussed. The city is providing seminars on how to better communicate with city government. A Judicial Town Hall Meeting with a panel of superior court judges is scheduled for February 10; it will be held in the City Council chambers.

January 27 Board Meeting

- 1. Treasurer Faith Rogers provided a financial report. LVNA is currently solvent, and advertising revenues cover the cost of printing the Villager.
- 2. The board discussed guest speaker recommendations for upcoming general meetings and possibilities for meeting topics.
- 3. Board members discussed the fact that the board membership does not currently reflect the diversity of Lakewood Village. All agreed that Lakewood Village needs more representation and involvement from all cultures in the neighborhood. ■



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February in Your Yard and Garden

- Purchase bare-root plants.
 Cover the roots until you have the time and the weather is right for planting.
- Order bare-root fruit trees from specialty nurseries. They will usually stop shipping bare-root fruit trees by the end of March.
- Send in orders to seed companies before they run out of stock later in spring.
- Clean and repair garden tools. Sharpen the blades of pruning tools and shovels. Service the lawn mower.
- Complete pruning of deciduous trees, shrubs, vines, fruit trees, and roses.
- o If desired and if deciduous plants have not leafed out yet, apply a last application of dormant spray to kill overwintering insects. It is particularly important to use a lime sulfur spray for peach and nectarine trees to prevent a fungus commonly known as peach leaf curl that causes distorted leaves and scarred fruit.
- Select and plant azaleas, camellias, and rhododendrons while they are in bloom.
- Fertilize spring-blooming bulbs as the foliage emerges. Some growers recommend dried blood meal; follow the directions on the package, sprinkling the blood meal around the emerging foliage.

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
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Community Calendar

Did You Lose a Dog?

Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety Animal Control officers are trying to help out a dog found in a Sunnyvale park. The young adult Pitbull Terrier was found in the Orchard Gardens/John Christian Greenbelt area of north Sunnyvale.

According to animal control officer Michelle Morgan, the white-with-black dog was wearing a pink nylon collar and a black leash. A multicolored tug-toy was found with the dog. Morgan said the dog was reported to DPS in the late afternoon of January 10, and may have been in the park from earlier in the day. Animal control



officers brought the dog in to provide her shelter from the rain and to try to find her home.

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Lakewood Village's 50th




Lakewood Village is 50 years old in 2005. Starting with this

issue, we'll take a look at how it started and how it has changed over the years.


Before Lakewood Village was built, it was entirely agricultural. After World War II, ten investors bought 250 acres in what is now the "Fairwood side" of Lakewood Village and built the Santa Clara Valley Airport, as you can see in these photos from the late 1940s. The land was graded for a runway, and had a mechanic's shop and a small office.



The approximate location of today's Lakewood Village is marked with a dark outline on this photo. You may be able to see a small runway at the lower left corner of the outlined area.



On the left side of this photo is the Bayshore Highway (now US 101). Across the top is Lawrence Station Road (now Lawrence Expressway).



The two-lane road running left to right in this photo is the Bayshore Highway. The shop and office are to the left of the taxiway on the left side of the photo.

Amateur aviators used the Santa Clara Valley Airport until the land was sold for development in 1955, part of which became Unit I of Lakewood Village.
